- O Start conversations with your high school counselor and family about your plans. Brainstorm a list of colleges you may want to tour.
- O Explore careers and areas of study you're interested in. Follow a professional for a day and see if what they do appeals to you.
- O Take challenging courses in core academic subjects. At OC, we offer concurrent courses to help start your college journey early.

- O Research universities with your student and explore the varying admission processes and scholarship criteria. Make the most of your student's college visit days as a pre-senior by using them to tour different universities.
- O Connect with admissions counselors to fully understand the resources available at colleges of interest.

Earn Your Wings — Starting a week before school begins, Earn Your Wings helps transition your student into college life. They'll experience OC as an Eagle through themed activities, community service on Kite Day and a rich introduction to OC's history. Your student will form friendships, enjoy entertainment and integrate worship into daily life. Their journey starts here!

Freshman Experience — The freshman experience doesn't end after Earn Your Wings. OC's Freshman Experience team in Student Life supports your student throughout the year. Graduate Programs – OC offers graduate programs in business, education, engineering, computer science and human science. These affordable, quality programs provide competitive tuition rates and financial aid options for accessible education.

Fitness & Recreation – OC's Fitness Center and recreational opportunities boost student health and community. The Fitness Center offers equipment and group fitness classes for all schedules and preferences. The 3.1-mile campus trail connects with Edmond's trail system for outdoor fitness.

TeamOC supports your student's fitness goals, including running the OKC Memorial Marathon as part of a large team. Join other events like the 2.5mile free Glow Run and the family-friendly Holiday Hustle, featuring 5k and 10k runs, a kid's run and a pancake breakfast.

Talon's Table – Talon's Table is OC's food pantry combating student food insecurity. It's open to all OC students, faculty and staff during Student Success hours (8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday). Students can use Talon's Table by visiting Student Success or scanning the QR code around campus for pickup times. STUDENT INSURANCE

Full-time students must provide proof of health insurance. If proof of insurance is not provided they'll be enrolled in the UnitedHealthcare Student Resources (UHCSR) plan. All International students at OC on an F1 Visa are required to enroll in the UHCSR plan.

MAKING EDUCATION AFFORDABLE

We are dedicated to making your student's education accessible and affordable, offering a variety of scholarships. Over 90% of our students receive financial aid, with more than \$21 million awarded in scholarships. Students may qualify for scholarships based on academic focus, extracurriculars and talents.

Some of our more popular scholarships include:

- Merit Awards Merit Awards are academic honors students earn based on their highest composite ACT, CLT or SAT score, an unweighted cumulative high school GPA or a combination of test scores and GPA.
- Heritage Scholarship OC offers a special scholarship for first-time college students who are active members of a church of Christ youth group. The Heritage Scholarship guarantees 50% of tuition is met after all OC aid is included and is renewable for up to eight semesters.
- Church Match Scholarship OC will match your church scholarship up to \$1,000 per academic year. This award will stack on top of the Heritage Scholarship.

UNIQUE ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES

FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Concurrent Enrollment – OC's Concurrent Enrollment program offers high school students an opportunity to jump-start their college career. For just \$245 per course, they gain access to college-level education and graduate on time with a manageable credit load. Benefits include expert instruction, exclusive perks and a vibrant campus community.



Honors Global Academy (HGA) - HGA at OC provides high school students a study abroad experience in Vienna, Austria, exploring European art, history and culture. Students earn three hours of university credit transferable to other institutions. The program cost includes airfare, transfers, field trips, transportation passes, museum admissions and housing accommodations. Options are available for credit and noncredit participation. This opportunity enriches students' academic journey and fosters a global mindset.



HONORS GLOBAL

Honors Summer Academy (HSA) - HSA at OC is a one-week program for high-achieving high school students in grades 9-11. Students earn two hours of transferable university credit through in-person courses with OC's Master Teachers. Admission requires specific test scores or a recommendation letter. The cost is \$600, significantly discounted by scholarships. Students can build academic skills, make lifelong friends and gain college experience on OC's campus.



FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS

Business Bootcamp – Business Bootcamp is a fall orientation for incoming freshmen and transfer business majors held yearly the week before Earn Your Wings. Throughout the Bootcamp, students learn business theory and practice through a real-world team project, working with BUSINESS consultants to develop and present a new business concept to воотсамр potential investors. Students attending Bootcamp receive one hour of academic credit and will not have to take BUSA-1211, Introduction to Business, during the fall semester.



Engineering Summer Academy (ESA) - Engineering Summer Academy is a

fun-filled week for incoming engineering majors and takes place each year a week before Earn Your Wings. Students learn through challenging projects using catapults, deciphering messages and programming robotic vehicles. The program's cost includes one hour of course credit (ENGR-1111), as well as room and board for the week. Space is limited to the first 54 students.



Honors – The Honors Program at OC offers high-achieving students a rigorous academic experience with smaller, discussion-based classes. Students benefit from critical thinking, research and interdisciplinary learning opportunities, as well as professional development and close interactions with faculty mentors. The program includes sponsored excursions to local cultural venues and events, a shared living community and study abroad options.



Study Abroad — We offer several study abroad opportunities for students to immerse themselves in different cultures and gain global perspectives. Students receive support for a safe and enriching experience with various destinations and programs, fostering personal and academic growth.

Summer Session — OC offers summer sessions to help students stay on track or get ahead. With multiple start dates throughout the summer, most classes are available online. Encourage your student to contact the registrar or speak with their advisor to learn more about available options.

GRADUATE AN EAGLE

Graduating students at OC will be charged a \$100 graduation fee, covering regalia, ceremony expenses and degree postage. This fee applies to all graduates, regardless of participation in commencement. Honor students should contact their sponsors for cords or medallions worn at the ceremony. Undergraduates may graduate with distinction: summa cum laude (3.85-4.00 GPA), magna cum laude (3.60-3.84 GPA) or cum laude (3.40-3.59 GPA). Honors in the program are based on the student's GPA and hours completed as of the previous term, with final honors recorded on the transcript and diploma if there are changes.

The following terms and definitions classify students in attendance at OC:

- Freshmen Students with fewer than 30 semester hours credit.
- Sophomores Students with 30 to 59 semester hours credit.
- Juniors Students with 60 to 89 semester hours credit.
- Seniors Students with 90 or more semester hours credit.
- **Transfers** Students who have completed 16 or more college-level hours since graduating from high school and before attending OC.
- Full-Time Students taking 12 semester hours or more during any semester.
- Graduate A student in a dual undergraduate/graduate degree program is considered a graduate student when they have completed eight fulltime (12-hour) semesters, including full-time summer or winter semesters, of undergraduate studies. These full-time semesters may be completed at OC or another institution. The change to graduate student status will

Good Standing


To be considered in good standing, students must maintain the cumulative GPA shown below:

- Freshmen 1.70 (D)
- Sophomore 2.0 (C)
- Junior 2.0 (C)
- Senior 2.0 (C)

All students will have an academic status check at the end of each semester.

CLASSROOM FAQS

- What are credits, hours and credit hours? In higher education, credits and credit hours refer to units of academic measurement for courses. They represent the value of a course and are used to track progress toward a degree. Hours can refer to the amount of time a student spends in class each week. Typically, a three-credit hour course means a class meets for three hours a week.
- 2. How long does it take to earn a college degree? At OC, earning a college degree typically takes four years for a full-time student pursuing a bachelor's degree. However, the exact duration can vary depending on factors such as the chosen major, course load, transfer credits and whether the student participates in internships or co-op programs. Some students may graduate earlier or later depending on their individual circumstances.
- 3. Is class attendance mandatory? Class attendance policies vary by course and professor at OC. Generally, regular attendance is encouraged, and absences may impact grades. Check individual course syllabuses for specific requirements.
- 4. What about class size? OC boasts a 16:1 student-faculty ratio. Our small class sizes allow for more personalized attention from professors, increased opportunities for participation and discussion and a supportive learning environment. Smaller classes also help students build stronger relationships with their peers and instructors.
- 5. Do course numbers have a special meaning? Yes. Course numbers indicate the level, subject and number of credit hours. The first digit reflects the course level (e.g., 1 for freshman, 2 for sophomore). The prefix shows the department (e.g., ENGR for engineering, HIST for history). While the last digit represents the number of credit hours.
- 6. What is MyOC.edu? MyOC.edu is the online portal for students, faculty and staff. It serves as a hub for accessing academic and administrative resources, including class schedules, grades, course registration and other campus services. Students can use the portal to stay connected and manage their academic journey at OC.

CAMPUS LIVING

RESIDENCE LIFE

At OC, our residence halls provide more than just housing – we offer lively communities where students build lifelong friendships, access academic support and experience personal growth. Livein professionals guide students through college life, creating a comfortable, supportive environment that feels like home.

HOUSING OPTIONS:

- Freshman Residence Halls Designed specifically for first-year students, these halls provide weekly devotionals, bimonthly events and service projects to support their transition to college life. Curfew and dorm checks are in place to help students establish healthy routines and aid in their smooth transition to more independent living.
- Sophomore Residence Halls Provide more independence for sophomores, juniors and seniors, with increased privacy and roommate flexibility.
- Apartment-Style Housing Ideal for upperclassmen, offering private and independent living arrangements similar to small apartments.
- Off-Campus Housing While OC encourages on-campus living, certain criteria allow students to live off-campus, including age, credit hours, part-time status, marriage or dependent children.

HOUSING FAQS

- When will my student find out where they are living and who their roommates are? – Assignments will be posted on oc.edu/MyOChome two months before the first day of school.
- 2. When does my student move into their residence hall? Housing opens for all students on Saturday, Aug. 17 before classes begin. However, if your student is participating in Business Bootcamp or Engineering Summer Academy, they will move in earlier and will receive additional information from their program organizers.
- 3. Does my student have to be up to date on vaccines before moving in? – Yes, your student must be up to date on vaccines before moving in. Oklahoma State Senate Bill 787 requires proof of immunization for hepatitis B (three injections) and MMR (measles, mumps, rubella – two injections). New students in campus housing must

also either sign a waiver of informed refusal or be vaccinated for meningitis. For exemptions, students who meet certain conditions may be excused from the vaccination requirements.



- 4. What if my student needs to cancel or change their housing assignment?
 Email housing@oc.edu for assistance.
- 5. What happens if my student was assigned to a building that wasn't one of their choices? We make assignments based on the order we receive applications. If a student's first choice is full, we'll assign them to their second choice. They can get on our wish list (the form is on OC's housing website) and we'll move them if anything opens.



6. Can my student live off campus? — The criteria and offcampus petition form are found at:

CAMPUS SAFETY

Our campus enjoys a secure location on the outskirts of Oklahoma City, boasting a low crime rate and round-the-clock security provided by eight CLEET-certified, fully commissioned and armed campus police officers.

ADDITIONAL SAFETY MEASURES:

- Well-lit campus for safety after dark.
- Emergency call boxes in remote areas.

FERPA

Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), students have control over the privacy of their educational records, including grades. Your student can grant you access to their grades through the MyOC portal by providing your contact information and authorization.

MONEY MATTERS

Student Financial Services – OC's Student Financial Services office assists students and parents with questions about billing, financial aid and payment plans. Students should remain in contact with their financial counselor to avoid any holds resulting from monetary issues.

Who is billed for enrollment fees and tuition? — The student is billed directly for enrollment fees and tuition. If you plan to handle these payments, ensure your student shares the billing details with you and adds you as their proxy or authorized user.

When should tuition and fees be paid? — Tuition and fees are due by the first day of class each semester unless payment arrangements are made through Student Financial Services. Students can view billing statements through their MyOC portal. OC offers payment plans for those who need them. For more information or assistance, email financialservices@oc.edu.

EAGLE BUCKS

Eagle Bucks is a prepaid spending account students can use on campus for various purchases. As a parent, you can add Eagle Bucks in increments of \$10 to your student's ID card, providing them with a convenient and secure way to pay for essentials such as:

- Dining: Your student can use Eagle Bucks at on-campus dining locations, including The Branch, The Brew, Chick-fil-A, Aguila Grill and Jimmy John's.
- **Bookstore:** Students can use Eagle Bucks to purchase school supplies and OC merchandise from the on-campus bookstore.
